CHDP Updates

#### **Program Revisions**

Provider Information Notice (PIN) <u>16-02</u> was released in July on the newly revised Health Assessment Guidelines (HAGs) — **20 of the 27 sections** have been updated. All providers are urged to review the updates which can be found on <u>http://www.dhcs.ca.gov/services/chdp/Pages/HAG.aspx</u>. These guidelines set health assessment standards for providers serving CHDP children.

Also in July, PIN <u>16-03</u> was released announcing that the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Bright Futures periodicity schedule will now be used for fee-for-service CHDP health assessments. In addition, the dental schedule now shows that all children are required to be referred to a dentist beginning at age one. See Attachment A for the new schedule of health assessments.

#### **CHDP Trainings**

Thank you to everyone who attended the Audiometric Screening Training on August 31st as well as the Vision Screening Training on October 13th! Our next scheduled hearing and vision trainings will be in 2017, however, frequency is largely based on demand. **CHDP hearing and vision screening certifications are required for all staff who conduct the screenings during CHDP exams.** Please keep in mind that certificates are good for 4 years or for one year if you do not conduct a screening in that time.

- $\Rightarrow$  Autism screening
- ⇒ Dyslipidemia screening
- ⇒ Psychosocial/behavioral assessment and reassessment
- $\Rightarrow$  Two types of HIV screening
- ⇒ Alcohol and drug use assessment

#### **Bullying Prevention**

October was National Bullying Prevention Month, but how does bullying affect health? **Physical injury, social and emotional distress, and even death are all possible results of bullying.** Adolescents who bully, have been bullied, or both, are at risk for a range of behavioral and mental health issues.

According to the CDC, in 2013, 20% of high school students reported being bullied on school property in the 12 months before the survey. For the 2012-2013 school year, 8% of public school students aged 12-18 reported being bullied on a weekly basis.

Research on how to effectively address and prevent bullying is still being established. However, there are several elements that look promising:

- Improving supervision of students
- Using school rules and behavior management in the classroom and throughout the school to detect and address bullying by providing consequences for bullying
- Having a school-wide anti-bullying policy and enforcing that policy consistently
- Promoting cooperation among different professionals and between school staff and parents

#### **Physicals**

#### Vaccinations

For the 2016-2017 flu season, the nasal spray is NOT recommended by the CDC. Please see your pediatrician for the vaccine injection.

#### Car Seat Law Updates and Resources

Beginning January 1, 2017, there will be a major change to the car seat law in California. Currently, only children up to 1 year are required to ride rear-facing in a car seat in the back seat of a vehicle. Now, the rear-facing requirement will extend to children up to age 2 years unless they weigh 40 pounds or more, or are 40 inches tall or more. If in violation, the driver or parent can be fined more than \$500 and get a point added to their driving record.

PHS also offers free, weekly Car Seat Safety Classes to SJC residents. These classes are every Wednesday at 11am in Spanish and 2pm in English. Afterwards, participants can buy a car seat for \$40 or \$30 with proof of low-income— WIC or Medi-Cal. The class fulfills the court-mandated Child Passenger Safety course requirement for a car seat law violation ticket. ## Public Health News

#### **Rising Syphilis Rates**

In San Joaquin County (SJC), syphilis rates are increasing in both men and women of all ages and ethnicities. Syphilis in women has doubled each year for the past 2 years, from 8 in 2013 to 38 in 2015. Six babies were born with congenital syphilis in 2015 as compared to just two per year in 2014 and 2013. The total number of reported infectious syphilis cases increased from seven in 2008 to 129 in 2015. This number could reach 200 in 2016. Details can be viewed on the San Joaquin County Public Health Services website.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends the following to reduce the risk of getting syphilis:

- Abstaining from all sexual contact is the only way to avoid any STD.
- If sexually active, be in a long-term monogamous relationship with a partner who has tested negative for STDs.
- Use latex condoms the right way, every time. Contact with a syphilis sore that is not covered by a condom can still transmit the bacteria.

For questions on syphilis services and resources in SJC, contact Public Health Community Services at 209-468 -3845. Based on the client's needs, they offer case management; risk reduction counseling; and assure that sexual partners are notified of exposure to syphilis and tested.

#### **National Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Week**

Last week, October 23rd through 29th, was National Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Week. The theme this year was, "Is your child at risk for lead poisoning? Check for lead in and around your home."

San Joaquin County's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP) took this opportunity to work with community partners by informing parents of at-risk children of the importance of blood lead testing. There is no known safe blood lead level, and lead poisoning can permanently impair a child's intellectual and social develop-



ment. Many at-risk children have not been tested for lead. Please take time to ensure all children on a government assisted health program are screened at both 12 and 24 months. Please call Gale Heinrich, San Joaquin County's Lead Program Coordinator, at 209-468-2593 with any questions.

### **E-lactancia**

E-lactancia (www.e-lactancia.org) is a reference website on medications that are compatible with breastfeeding. The website categorizes each medication into one of four categories: very low risk (green), low risk (yellow), high risk (orange), and very high risk (red). Natural and herbal remedies are also listed.



All the information is available in both English and Spanish. Currently, the site is web-based only, but an app for smartphones is coming soon.
